

BILLS PASSED THROUGH THE LEGISLATURE

AB 1061 - Protecting Mobile Home Residents - Water service fees in mobile home parks are ambiguous and often increase without explanation. These fees can add up and be burdensome, and AB 1061 protects mobile home residents from these unfair water service charges.

AB 1337 - Keeping BART Safe - With the new Milpitas and Berryessa/North San Jose stations, it's unclear whether BART has the authority to enforce certain security measures. AB 1337 makes changes to allow BART to implement transit security protocols to keep BART stations safe.

AB 898 - **Enhancing the Accuracy of Court Records** - This bill seeks to ensure conviction expungements and reductions are correctly represented so that people eligible for relief are not held back from reentering society due to inaccurate court records.

AB 1157 - **State Transit Assistance Program Reports -** This bill provides the State Controller's Office (SCO) with additional time to identify errors and resolve issues which will help ensure accurate allocations are made to transit operators.

AB 1228 - **Probation Detention Reform -** The cornerstone of America's justice system is the presumption of innocence. This legislation reforms the probation department so that an individual accused of violating probation is only detained if a court finds it necessary for the public's safety.

AB 339 - **Keeping Digital/Call-in Options for Government Meetings** - During the pandemic, local governments transformed the way meetings were held, allowing the public to make comments and have their opinions heard through remote options from the comfort of their homes. AB 339 would have preserved that ability for cities and counties with populations of 250,000+.

Note: While AB 339 was vetoed, accessibility, transparency, and integrity are core democratic values of mine and it continues to be important to modernize government for constituents.

AB 1444 - Protecting Small Businesses & Consumers - Small businesses have barely stayed afloat with their narrow margins becoming increasingly smaller due to high fees from third-party ordering apps. AB 1444 would have prohibited food delivery platforms from charging fees for forwarded calls unless the call directly resulted in a paid order. It would have also required a disclosure if an order resulted in extra fees to restaurants and for business contracts to be more transparent with their fees.

Note: While AB 1444 was vetoed, the practice of rerouting calls for the purpose of charging commissions has ceased.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

It's been a busy first year in the State Legislature! From fighting the pandemic and planning for recovery, to making smart, timely investments for the future – it's been a privilege and an honor to serve you.

Education

I was proud to sit on six committees including: the Budget Committee, the Education Committee, and the Subcommittee on Education Finance. We made historic investments in education which will fund a new transitional kindergarten grade, more opportunities for summer and after-school teaching, and increased funding for K-12 education and for California residents at universities:

- \$123.9 billion Highest level of school and per-pupil funding in California's history
- \$3 billion to convert school sites into full-service community schools, with wraparound mental health, social services, and family resources
- \$1 billion for summer and after-school programs at all schools
- \$150 million increased funding for the Career Technical Education Incentive Grant (CTEIG) for a total of \$300 million ongoing
- \$86.4 million for career technical education (CTE) regional occupational centers (ROCPs)
- Universal Pre-K by 2025
- Restored funding for UCs, CSUs, and the Community College system as well as financial aid expansion
- Eliminates age and time out of high school requirements for Cal Grants for community college students, expanding aid to an estimated 133,000 students
- And much more!

Stop AAPI Hate

\$156.5 million was approved to provide resources to address rising hate incidents against AAPI and other communities. This is one of the only AAPI majority districts in the State; therefore, this was a priority effort with the need especially apparent in the district. Below are some highlights:

- \$110 million to community organizations who are providing vital victim services and prevention
- \$10 million to track, respond, and prevent incidents of racial bias
- \$10 million will go to ethnic media outlets to reach AAPI and other underserved communities in California
- \$10 million to increase accurate data collection and data equity on AAPI needs, challenges, and barriers
- \$10 million to anti-bias block grant to provide funding to schools to create restorative justice programs to address hate early
